- → What is different in these photographs?
- Is there anything the same in the photographs?
- → What colour are the photographs?
- ∀ Have you ever been to a play park at the beach?
- ∀ Have you ever been in a public paddling pool?
- What are the children wearing in the 1960s photograph?
- Is this the same as what you would wear to go in a paddling pool?
- \P Do you think it was warm or cold the day the 1960s photograph was taken?
- \forall Do you think the water would be warm or cold in each photograph?


- How many people are wearing coats or jackets?

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

- Talk about swimming and water safety.
- Make a paddling pool using a container.
- Count how many cups it takes to fill the paddling pool container.
- **Experiment** with floating and sinking objects in the paddling pool container.
- A Make a tinfoil boat.
- Left Float the tinfoil boat in the paddling pool container.
- ▲ See how many coins can be placed on the tinfoil boat before it sinks.
- A Make a sail for your boat. What happens if you blow on it?
- Place items such as a swimming cap, sponge and face cloth into a container of water. Talk about how the items change when wet.
- 4 Make a seaside themed playground assault course.
- Play a seaside playground themed dice game. E.g., if 1 is rolled bounce as though on a seesaw, if 2 is rolled swoop like a seagull, if 3 is rolled glide as though on a slide, if 4 is rolled pretend to be on a climbing frame.
