Honour/Lordship Ownership	Barony of Muschamp Lowick was a manor in the Muschamp barony and its early history is exactly the same as Wooler. In 1250 Robert Muschamp died and the manor passed to his wife Isabel, she and her second husband Richard Morin enjoyed the full rights of lordship and claimed a share of the profits at the baronial court of Wooler. Isablel Morins death date is unknown but the Muschamp barony seems to be divided between her three daughters; Cicely wife of Odinel Ford, Margery wife of Malise earl of Strathearn and Isabel wife of William Huntercumbe. Their descendants in 1291 were the Huntercombe and Graham families who divided the manor of Lowick between them. The manor remains with the Graham and Huntercombe families however in 1412 a moiety of the manor is in the hands of Elizabeth Darcy widow of Sir Philip Darcy. This part of the manor remains with the Darcy family until 1490 when the share falling to Margery and Sir John Conyers was alienated before his death in 1490. Another share or even the whole of the manor fell to Elizabeth and Sir John Strangeways and follows the exact same descent as Wooler. The Strangeways are recorded in Lowick in 1514; it fell into the hands of Christopher Lepton along with Wooler who in 1584 sold it to Sir John Selby. It remained in the Selby family until 1686 when it was conveyed to Dorothy Collingwood. In 1722 the manor seems to have passed into the possession of the Haggerston family.
	The Huntercombe moiety is alienated to Thomas Hetton in 1333. It then passes through the Fenwick and Denton families until around 1568 it is in the hands of the Collingwood family. In 1628 Cuthbert Collingwood sells the manor to George Muschamp of Barmoor. The

	Muschamp family lost their Northumberland lands which appear to be purchased by William Carr of Etal around 1677. Later, with the rest of the Carr inheritance it passed to Sir Francis Blake. After this part of the manor became part of the Ford estate and now belongs to Lord Joicey. In 1921 Sir Edward Charlton de Marie Haggerston is listed as Lord of the Manor and principal landowner.
