





Charles Warriner, Roger Marr, George Bullock, Cuthbert Bullock, Gabriel Dunn & Thomas ----
Carnaby swore the 30th of Oct[ober]r 1761 filed the 19th Nov[emb]r 1761. Say that they attended the said Court on [th]e 30th of March last as Jurors in the Grand Jury there, & were sworn into that office.

That [th]e Duty of that Jury consists Cheifly in Walking [th]e boundaries of [th]e s[ai]d Borough & presenting Nusances & it is usual for them to make such presentm[en]ts to the Court in [th]e afternoon, their business being a work of time.

Charles Warriner for himself saith that Just before he & [th]e rest of [th]e s[ai]d Jury went out of Court on their Duty he this Depon[en]t asked, & the rest of [th]e Depon[en]ts say that they heard him ask Rob[er]t Lisle who acted as Steward if he intended to make any Freemen that day who replyed that he knew---- nothing of it or to that Effect

That they know no other Cause save that /of\ there being no of further business to do Why the sfaild Liste did not return to Court according to his Adjournment

That on their Return from their s[ai]d Duty as Jurors being informed that there had been an attempt in their absence to make cortain Persons Freemen who they wer[e] convinced had no right to be Freemen. They with several others of the s[ai]d Jury did go to the Queen's head where the s[ai]d Rob[er]t Lisle & many of the Suitors & Agents of [th]e s[ai]d Court dined & formally protested before the s[ai]d Rob[er]t Lisle & the Company there ag[ain]st the said proceeding contrary to the Custom & Constitution of [th]e s[ai]d Borough.

Roger Marr for himself saith that he was deputed a Messenger by [th]e rest of [th]e s[ai]d Jury to wait on the

s[ai]d Rob[er]t Lisle to know if he would go to Court in the Afternoon accord[in]g to his Adjournment & saith that [th]e accordingly waited twice on him & told him that [th]e s[ai]d Jury expected him & at same time endeavoured to remove certain Apprehensions of Danger which he [th]e s[ai]d Lisle pretended to to-have conceived in regard to his returning to [th]e s[ai]d Court, — the the Depon[en]t on [th]e strictest Enquiry not haveing been able to find any real Cause for such Apprehensions.

Wiliam Wright swore the 30th of Oct[obe]r 1761 filed the 19th Nov[emb]r 1761. Saith that he attended at [th]e s[ai]d Court on [th]e 30th of March last as Serjeant of the s[ai]d Borough, & saith that he heard Rob[er]t Liste who acted as Steward there declare there was not any intention of makeing Freemen that day

Saith he believes that Some of the Said Brothers Alledging A right to be made Free of Said Boroughpreferably to the Persons so Called by Said Mathew Potts laid their Hands on the Same Bible (which the said
Mathew Potts threw upon the Table of the said Court) with the said Other persons Called by the said Mathew—
Potts desireing they might be Sworn Freemen of the said Borough-----


Saith that said Robert Liste Appeared to Depon[en]t to be very Passive during this Transaction And did not as Depon[en]t Remembers Any way Interpose therein

Saith he doth not believe that Any of the Persons Concerned in the above Transaction intended to Commit or in Depon[en]ls Opinion did Commit Any not or Mischief but their intention was to preserve and support their Several Rights and Priviledges and those of said Borough of Morpeth

Says said Robert Lies without Determining any thing in regard to said Rights and Pretensions Order[e]d the Court to be Adjourned till 3 of the Clock in the afternoon w[h][ch being done the people in the Court to Depon[en]

Says





Says he receiv[e]d no Injury Insult or ill usage in said Court that day from Any person whoever

Nor did Deponent Apprehend any Danger or Mischief from Anything that happened there

Either to himself or Any Other person who Attended or was any way Concerned in the said Court

John Grey Swore 31st of October 1761 Filed Nov[embe]r 19th 1761 Saith that he did on the 30th of March last past

Attend the Court Leet and Court Baron of the Earl of Carlisle held in and for the Manor and Borough of Morpeth aforesaid as one of the Sultors of said Court. And that the aforesaigli Robert Lisle Genttleman | Acted as Steward of the said Court. And Depon[en]t heard said Rob[er]t Lisle in Answer to A Question put by Charles Warriner one of the Jury of Inquests belonging to said Court declare that he knew Nothing of Any Freemen to be made that day and that said Lisle was only there to try Causes

Saith that after the Causes depending in the said Court were all tryed and Finished,
Matthew Potts who Acted as Clerk or Assistant to said Court Called the Names of Several persons
to be Sworn Freemen of said Borough of Morpeth (who as Deponent was informed and
believed and now very believes were not lawfully intitled to their Freedom According to the
Custom of the said Borough) And at the Same time threw A Bible on the Table in Order
to Tender them the Usual Oath

Saith this unprecedented proceeding Occasioned a great discontent Among the Jury and Other Freemen and Brothers Attending the said Court And prompted some of them who has as Depon(ent) has been informed and believes A good right to their Freedom of said Borough to Assert their said right, And to lay their Hands on the said Bible with the said Other persons so Called by the said Matthew Potts at the same time requesting to be Sworn Freemen of said Borough

Saith that Although this Transaction Occasioned Several people to Speak together And Consequently some Noise in said Court Yet Depon(en)t Verily believes there was no Injury or Insult done or intended to be done by or to Any person then present Nor Any Business of the said Court intended to be interrupted or prevented

Saith the said Several Persons so Called by Said Mathew Potts to be made Freemen as afores[aild Contributed greatly towards making the said Noise

Saith he is persuaded and believes no lawful Business of the Court was prevented for th[at] it Appear[e]d to Depon[en]t from the said Mr Lisles Said Declaration and whole future Conduct that all the proper Business of the Court at that time was Finished and done, Said Lisle never Offering as Depon[en]t remembers to interpose his Authority or give Any Opinion in relation to the said Proceeding of said Mathew Potts

Saith after said Court was Adjourned Depon[en] together w[i]th the Jurors And most of the Other Freemen as suitors of the said Court dined with said Robert Lisle & said Mathew Potts at the Queens Head in Morpeth afores[ai]d And depon[en]t Sat at the Same Table with said Lisle, but doth not remember to have heard him Express Any Apprehension or fear of going into Court again in the afternoon

Says he went into the Market place in Morpeth afores[ai]d after Dinner about the time to which said Court was Adjourned And Expected said Court would sit Again to receive the presentm[en]ts of the Jury of Inquests which is Usually done in the afternoon

Says he knows not why Said Robert Lisle and Jury did not return to Court to Fini[sh] the Business of said Court (if Any remained to be done) for Deponent Saw no Tumult nor Riot nor Any Cause to Apprehend any Mischief nor Any greater Number of persons Assembled before the Door of said Court than Usual on A Court day.
