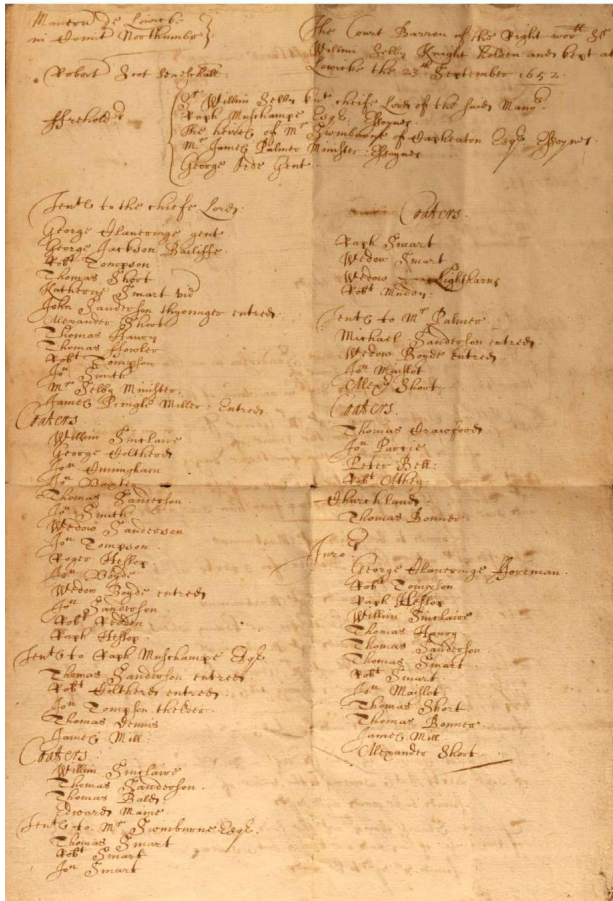

 [2] Possibly 'fold' and 'drift' run together into a single word and meaning a path for livestock to a fold (Keith Bailey)  
 [3] 'Peck': A dry capacity measure, 1/2 bushel, of four and salt generally reckoned to be 14lb, or (Nthumb, Almsick and Wooler), 1/3 of a bushel Winchester (other regional variations).
