Ownership	It is probable Healey was given to the Knights Templars by the lord of the barony of Baliol, in 1268 an inquisition on the death of John de Baliol states that it was held of him by the preceptor of Thornton. On suppression of the order of the Templars in 1308 their lands at Healey and Corbridge were taken by the crown. Healey then seems to have passed to the Knights Hospitallers until the reformation when it passed back to the crown. In 1550 two thirds of the vill were held by Sir Cuthbert Radclyffe, knight and the other third by John Ord. In 1553 certain lands belonging to Mount St John in Yorkshire were granted to Sir John Widdrington of Widdrington, knight and Cuthbert Musgrave of Harbottle with the occupants Sir Cuthebrt Radcliffe, knight and John Orde. They were to be held of the king as of the manor of East Greenwich by fealty, in free socage and not in chief. Healey eventually seems to pass to John Widdrington's grandson John Lawson of Bywell before 1608 and soon after to the Sanderson family. Healey is advertised for sale in 1816 and was purchased by Mr Robert Ormston of Newcastle it remained with this family until 1882 when it was devised to a cousin Mr William Aldam of Frickley near Doncaster. He was succeeded by his son Mr William Wright Warde-Aldam in 1890 whose family are owners to this day.
