Ownership	In the time of Henry II Thornbrough was part of the royal manor of Corbridge, granted to the de Burun family. William le Scot had a grant from Gilbert de Burun in 1189-99. By 1226 a moiety of the manor had passed into the Middleton family. The le Scot and Middleton families are both connected with ownership of the manor through the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. In 1423/4 Simon de Weldon V enters into a marriage agreement for his son involving a moiety of the manor of Thornbrough. By the early 1600s the Weldon family had made Thornbrough their main residence; however in 1636 the estate was sold to William Radcliffe of Naworth Castle. The property came with the rest of the Radcliffe estates to the Greenwich Hospital and was sold by auction in 1874 to Mr John Joicey. In 1904 it was sold to Mr J.H Straker of Howden Dene. In 1921 the executors of the late J.C Straker are listed as lords of the manor.
