Ownership	In the twelfth century Ralph fitz Main held three fourths of the manor of Togston. In 1240 Roger fitz Ralph, lord of Ditchburn, held three parts of Togston of the king, Roger de Toggisden holding under him by a knights service. The fourth part of the manor was held by the sergeant of carrying the king's writs from Warkworth to Bamburgh and for keeping the cattle at Togston taken for debts due to the Crown. In 1314 Roger fitz Ralph died and amongst his possessions held
	the manor of Togesdene. In 1396 John Beaumont, knight held three parts of Togston manor. In 1498 William Carr and Thomas Grey of Horton are recorded as holding the fourth part of Togston. In 1586 Ralph Grey of Horton sold his fourth part to his tenants John Wharrier, Edward Browell and John Turner. In 1590 Marmaduke Fenwick died and is recorded as holding land in Togsden.
	In 1632/3 the main land owners are Sir William Fenwick of Meldon, Francis Carnaby of Togston, Gerard Browell, Matthew Wharrier and John Patterson all of Togston. The family Smith also held lands in Togston from around 1639 and acquired other land there through marriage with John Patterson's daughter.
	In 1921 the Duke of Northumberland is recorded as lord of the manor and Viscount Furness, Ralph A. Dand and the trustees of the late T.G Smith are principal.
