Ownership	The township of Acomb is often described as West Acomb to differentiate it from Acomb in the parish of Bywell St Peter. In 1331 the Archbishop of Hexham remitted the arrears of John de Coastley of Acomb as they were worth so little. The prior and convent had a tithe grange and garden at Acomb for which in 1479, Peter de Gunnerton paid rent. In 1608 Acomb was surveyed and termed a grieveship and had tenants classed as customary, copyholders and leaseholders. The Lees and Armstrongs were landowners in Acomb for many generations between 1596 and 1764. In 1921 principle landowners are listed as Mr W.C.B Beaumont, William Richmond Mewburn esq., Mrs Charles W.C. Henderson, Miss Allgood and Mrs N.G Clayton. Despite NCH using there term manor, Acomb is not thought to have operated as a separate manor and may have formed part of
Courts	the demesne lands of Hexham Priory as part of the parochial chapelry of St John Lee.
