Ownership	Hugh de Bolbeck held Angerton, and on his death divided his estate between his four daughters Alice de Hunterscumbe, Maud Delaval, Phillipa de Lancaster and Margery Greystroke. Maud and Hugh's widow Theophania were living at Angerton on his death in 1262 (Hodgson, 1827, p.302). Alice and Maud died childless, and their moieties were claimed by John de Lancaster in 1328 (Hodgson, 1827, p.239). The Greystock moiety remained in the family, and through them to the Dacre and Howard families and was sold by Lord Carlisle to John Trevelyan, Ralph Atkinson and others (Hodgson, 1827, p.240). The Lancaster moiety may have passed to a daughter of John Lancaster, who married William de Herle (Hodgson, 1827, p.239). However Hodgson also says that an exchange took place, King Edward III in 1335 exchanging 2 ½ knight's fees in Whitchester with William Greystock for a moiety of the manor of Styford, and exchanging with Robert de Herle his half of the manor of Angerton, part of Whitchester and land in other places for half the manor of Styford and land in East Hedwin (Hodgson, 1827, p.240).
	Hodgson describes a branch of the Greys of Howick living in Low Angerton sometime in the 17th Century (Hodgson, 1827, p.313). Mackenzie gives Ralph Atkinson as the owner of Low Angerton, and describes his mansion house there (Mackenzie, 1825, p.161). Kelly's lists high and low Angerton separately, giving Frederick Straker as lord of the manor in both (Kelly, 1921, 146).
