Ownership	Asholme is the seat of an ancient line of gentry called Wallace who purchased lands there in 1637 from John Corbet of Orchard House, who died at the battle of Worcester in 1651, the final battle of the English Civil War.
	Asholme is described as a manor within the Wallace pedigree which begins in 1637.
	In 1921 Asholme is listed as a joint township with Lambley but a separate manor. The Hon. Mrs Hope-Wallace is lady of the manor and the trustees of the late James Hope-Wallace Esq. J.P. are principal landowners.
	Associated with West Coanwood which had coal and lime workings close to Asholme.
