Ownership	<p>Bradford was one of the manors of Bolam Barony, but after the division of the Barony was held in moieties (Hodgson, 1827, p.350). Alina, widow of John de Chauz, granted land to Elvrard de Bradford, and land was later given by James de Chauz and his wife Alice to Gilbert de Preston. James's heirs Thomas and Jane de Bekering gave five bovates to Richard de Croxton. A William de Croxton, supporter of Gilbert de Middleton's rebellion, forfeited a messuage and nine husbandlands, which were granted to Patrick and Isabella de Middleton. Some lands were granted to John de Strivelyn, whose estates were settled on John de Middleton and his wife Christian, and descended down his family to Charles Monck, who owned them during Hodgson's time (Hodgson, 1827, p.350).</p> <p>John Ogle died with lands in Bradford in 1568, passing down his family until in 1670 John Ogle the elder and John ogle the younger sold a third of the township to John Swinburne (Hodgson, 1827, p.351). Kelly's describes Sir Hubert Swinburne as the principal landowner and Lord of the Manor (Kelly, 1921, p.90).</p>
