Ownership	Through its early history Brandon follows Beanley as part of the lordship (NCH XIV, pp.398-401). It was granted along with Branton by Gospatric III to Edward his brother and was held by Robert of Biddleston from him. In 1242 Edward's grandson John held Eglingham, Hedgeley, Lemington, Brandon (as Bromdon) and Branton (as Brenton) in socage, for a sparrow hawk or 6d. annually. Robert of Biddleston died around 1240, leaving his two daughters Eva de Feritate and Margery Delaval (NCH XIV, p.402). The Delaval moiety remained in the family until 1471, when it passed under a settlement to Robert Mitford of Seghill (NCH XIV, p.402). His family held it until 1607, when it was sold to Cuthbert Collingwood of Branton (NCH XIV, p.402). The Collingwoods sold Brandon to Lancelot Allgood in 1689 (NCH XIV, 402). Brandon was still owned by the Allgoods at the time of NCH, however Kelly's (1921, 119) gives no landowner or lord of the manor.
