Honour/Lordship	Barony of Wark on Tweed also known as the Barony of Roos
Ownership	Broome Park along with Bolton made up the Parochial Chapelry of Bolton, in a northern part of the Parish of Edlingham. Together they are part of the Barony of Wark on Tweed.
	Walter Espec, Lord of Wark on Tweed; in 1121, endowed the Priory at Kirkham with lands and tithes which included two thirds of the Bolton tithe. The Manor remained in the hands of Walter Espec's successors, until Robert de Ros founded a hospital for a master, 3 chaplains and 13 lepers and placed it under the supervision of the monasteries of Kirkham and Rievaulx. This grant was confirmed by the King, the Bishop of Durham and the Archbishop of York in 1227.
	From 12th Century to the 16th Century Broome Park was held by Bolton hospital whose fortunes followed the changes which shaped the church at those times. The tithes raised from the estate within the parish of Edlingham supported both the Chapel at Bolton and the parish and were the subject of many disputes.
	In 1317 William de Ros conveyed the castle of Wark on Tweed and its appurtenances to the King, in exchange for estates elsewhere. However, he retained the advowson of the cells pertaining to the Priory of Kirkham and Bolton.
	Broome Park along with Bolton came into the custody of Thomas of Baumburgh. This was ratified by the King in 1331. Thomas de Baumburgh died in 1340 and was succeeded by Richard de Sixendale, Parson of Gedenay. The hospital continued to be subject to monastic control until the reformation and the dissolution of the monasteries.
	In 1553 the Lordship of the Manor of Bolton and Broome Park were granted by the crown to Robert Collingwood of Eslington, his heirs, and Alexander Collingwood. In 1580 Bolton was owned by Sir Cuthbert Collingwood. His grandson

	Then the estate continued to be held by the Burrell family and in 1914 was the property of Captain William Mathew Burrell JP.
	The original estate was added to by the Burrells by purchases of land in Abberwick and Bolton.
	In 1658 Henry and William Widdrington sold Broome Park to Thomas Burrell, of Burrell of Howtell in Glendale. However, the Widdrington family retained the right to quarry the land.
	Then Bolton and Broome Park were acquired by the Widdringtons of Black Heddon,
	Robert Collingwood inherited his estate but died 1638 without an heir.
