Ownership	Brotherwick was a manor held directly by the Crown by sergeancy. It was granted by Henry I to Henry de Hanvill the King's Falconer on condition of paying an annual rent. In 1274 it was found that William de Hanvill had neglected to pay his rent for sixteen years and sold parts of the manor to Robert fitz Roger, William Latimer, Thomas de Elmedon, John Absolon and various others. As a result of this parts of Brotherwick manor are owned by numerous families over the next 500 years. The prominent holders are the Fenwick, Percy, Hesilrigg and Ogle families. Parts of the manor a gradually purchased by the Percy family and in 1862 they purchase the final moiety from the Fenwicks of Nunriding. In 1921 the Duke of Northumberland is recorded as lord of the manor and principal landowner.
